There are 3 Easy Ways to register/renew your dog license for the year 2020:

#1: Complete the application <u>HERE</u> & mail the following to the Town Office (10 Village Square Rd., North Yarmouth, ME 04097): your application, payment (checks made payable to the Town of North Yarmouth), and a copy of your dog's rabies certificate. Once it is processed, we will mail the license to you.

#2: Between October 15th and January 31st, you may go <u>online</u> to complete the registration.

#3: Stop by the Town Office and register your dog in person. Make sure you have a copy of your dog's rabies certificate.

Searching for the "Oldest" citizen in Town



North Yarmouth's Boston Post Cane must once again be awarded to the "oldest" citizen in town. The tradition of the Boston Post Cane was started in August 1909 by Boston Post Publisher, Edwin A. Grozier. He distributed some 600 canes to New England towns, which were to be awarded to the Oldest Citizen in town and at his or her death to be transmitted to the next oldest living citizen.

To be eligible to receive the honor a person must:

Be the oldest living person residing in North Yarmouth at the time designation is made;
Must have resided in the Town of North Yarmouth within the last five years and a U.S. Citizen not less than 15 of the last 40 years.



Winter Sand for Residential Driveways

Winter sand is available for residents' personal use. Each residential dwelling is eligible for up to 20 gallons (four 5gallon pails) of sand per storm. The use of municipal sand for the sanding of private roads is prohibited.

Sand pile is located at the entrance of the PWD facilities – 40 Parsonage Rd.

Did You Know?

Maine State Law states a person may not place and allow to remain on a public way snow or slush that has not accumulated there naturally.

Town of North Yarmouth Winter Parking Ban

- The parking of vehicles upon any public highway between the hours of 12:01AM and 6AM during the period from November 15th through April 15th is prohibited.
- Any vehicles parked in violations of this ordinance may be hauled away at the owner's expense in accordance with the provisions of MRSA Title 29 Sec. 4.



Curbside Pickup Reminders


Residents **MUST** have their household waste & recycling at the curb by **7am** on the day of scheduled pickup.

Reasons why ...

The following items could affect your normal pick up time.

- > Number of trucks picking up on that day.
- > Weather can delay or create an earlier pickup.
- ▶ Mechanical issues with a haul truck.

PRIVATE ROADS

• Casella Waste Systems picks up on all holidays except for Thanksgiving and Christmas.

- Casella Waste Systems rarely cancels pickup due to bad weather. Your pickup time may be delayed though in comparison to most days.

If the road is not plowed, sanded or has flooded, for the safety of their employees, Casella will not travel on the road to pick up your household waste and recycling.

HOLIDAY RECYCLING TIPS

RECYCLING DOs to get you on the Nice list this holiday season:

Aside from all of your standard household mixed paper and assorted rigid containers made of cardboard, plastic, glass, tin or aluminum, there are a number of items that are commonly used at the holidays that you can recycle. Here are the top five:

- 1. Wrapping paper that rips: If it rips, it recycles. Put it the rip test and it if passes, place it in your bin.
- 2. **Holiday cards:** even if they have glitter on them, they are recyclable. Don't let all that recyclable paper go to waste this season, put them in your recycling bin!
- 3. Aluminum foil pans: whether its pie plates, fruit cake pans or any other aluminum pan, remember the rule that if the pan is not caked with sticky, thick food residue, then the pans are recyclable. The same goes for aluminum foil! Aluminum is a very nice material for your recycling bin!
- 4. **Cardboard and gift boxes:** with the rise of cybershopping, you might have a bigger inventory of cardboard boxes, never mind those gift boxes that make such pretty packages under the tree. Break them down flat before placing them in your bin to ensure enough space for the higher volume of recyclables you are likely to incur through the holidays.
- 5. **Cookie tins:** When you receive tins of cookies, consider saving them to contain your own baked gift next year, or donating them to Goodwill or any other salvage shop. But if they are no longer useful, do place them in your recycling bin!

Recycling DON'Ts that will land you on the Naughty list:

- 1. **Bows and ribbon:** there is no way to recycle these, so your best bet is to save them and reuse them each year or do away with disposable gift wrap altogether with decorative cloth gift bags. Bows and ribbon are naughty for the recycling bin.
- 2. Wrapping paper that doesn't rip: if your wrapping paper doesn't rip, then it is probably made of plastic vs. paper and therefore cannot be recycled. We'll talk about the wrapping paper you can recycle when we list the "Nice" to recycle list.
- 3. **Christmas tree lights:** Maybe you're trimming the tree only to discover that last year's lights are no longer repairable. In this case, your best bet is to donate them to a local Goodwill store. They can sell broken lights onto the market because of the valuable copper wires usually contained inside. Whatever you do, don't put them in your recycling bin, as they will end up clogging ecomaine's sorting equipment.
- 4. **Foil caked with residue:** Aluminum foil is endlessly recyclable if it is not caked with cheese or other sticky, messy residue. If it is caked with residue, you are best off tossing it in the trash.
- 5. **Plastic cutlery:** If you can avoid it altogether, that is the best strategy, but if you need to use it, consider reusing it again and again. When you can't use it any longer, you should put this type of plastic in the trash, not your recycling bin.

MSAD#51 Pre-K Application

MSAD #51 offers a voluntary Pre-K program with limited availability. They are able to enroll 32 students (16 each session) starting in September 2020.

The program will run half days (morning and afternoon sessions) four days per week (M, T, Th, F) for approximately 135 days during the school year. The program is located at Mabel I. Wilson school and is in partnership with Child Development Services (CDS).
