Question #1

Shall the Town authorize the Board of Selectmen to:

A) Create a municipal and community campus on the Memorial School parcel by renovating and reusing a portion of the school facility including the gymnasium; and

B) Sell the existing Town Hall parcel for residential and/or commercial development to increase the tax and employment base; and

C) Create a sewer system infrastructure that will enable these specific proposals A) and B), and stimulate future village development as envisioned in the Town Comprehensive Plan while protecting the aquifer resource.

Question #2

Shall the Town authorize the Board of Selectmen to:

A) Immediately terminate making any expenditures and performing any work to study or to develop a Municipal sewer system;

B) Rebuild Wescustogo Hall in compliance with the 1997 agreement under which the Town accepted the property;

C) Retain the current Town Hall and land. Make renovations and additions to the building as needed over time for municipal purposes;

D) Solicit through a Request for Proposal (RFP) creative plans to renovate, repurpose, replace or sell the Memorial School building and property. Such proposals should consider but not be limited to public uses, private uses, senior housing, or combinations thereof. The Board of Selectmen shall not direct any specific uses to be included or excluded in the Proposals;
E) Bring all the Request for Proposals (RFP) received to Public Hearings to solicit resident feedback and then bring a recommended plan for the Memorial School property to a municipal vote in a manner that will maximize resident turnout.

The Cumberland Woodbank, a local, allvolunteer organization that provides heating assistance to needy families throughout the region, has raised almost \$12,000 this year –




Support Our Local 4-H Club & Community Food Pantry
