Baston Park - A Work in Progress



Books, Books, and more Books !

Your little library. located at the North Yarmouth Community Center is well stocked with a fun selection of novels, memoirs, historical reads and other genre.

Folks have been more than generous in helping to supply the room with "good reads'. In fact, we don't have enough shelving available to get all the books out, so please come see what we have and help yourself to a book or two!

The story of Baston Park began in 2002, when Rosalyn and Dick Baston donated land alongside the Royal River to the town of North Yarmouth to create a park that would give residents access to the river. The family envisioned the park as a restful place for townspeople and their children.

Over the years, the park became overgrown with saplings, weeds and invasive honeysuckle. Worse, the riverbank soil had shifted. That created a blockage that created a pond and restricted clear access to the river. To repair it, dredging would be necessary.

In 2019, a group of people - all concerned with the renovation of the park - came together. Town officials, the Roval River Conservation Trust, volunteers and the North Yarmouth Public Works Dept. agreed that the park could be reclaimed from the wild and renovated to be what Mr. and Mrs. Baston envisioned.

The goal: Reclaim the land from the wild and improve the park to include a handicapped-accessible boat launch

and family recreation area. A \$5000 donation from the Royal River Conservation Trust enabled the town to hire Sevee and Maher Engineers to help plan the project and obtain DEP approvals, necessary to dredging the river.

Budget support from the town enabled the project to continue. In late summer 2020, the Public Works Dept., led by the Bastons' son, Clark, cleared out large quantities of the undergrowth and invasives. They even seeded new drass.

In late October, soil samples were taken and sent for testing. When this is complete, the results will become part of the application for approval by the DEP.

Volunteers Al Ahlers and Steve Palmer think the approval will arrive over the winter, allowing the dredging project to begin as soon as possible in 2021.

Share the Road

PEA LANE

Advisorv bicvcle lanes (ABL's) provide a new way to share the road. You will find these lanes installed in two locations in the Village Center: Pea Lane and The Lane.

This is how they work:

Drivers share a wide travel lane with oncoming vehicles. Each side of the road has an advisory

lane marked by a dashed line. People can walk and bicycle in this lane.

Drivers move into the advisory lane when space is needed to pass an oncoming vehicle. But first, motorists must vield to people who are already walking and bicycling in the lane.

If a person is already in the lane, the driver must

Boston Post Cane Presented to Marion Goff

The Boston Post Cane is a New England tradition that dates back to 1909. This was the year that the Boston Post newspaper gave gold-headed and ebony canes to approximately 431 towns as part of a publicity stunt. The canes were to be given to the town's oldest resident. North Yarmouth still carries on this tradition.



Marion and her late husband Vernon moved to North Yarmouth in the early 1950's, raising their three children here in town. The Goff family owned and operated the well known Goff's Hardware on Main Street in Yarmouth. Marion is still lives on her own and is active in her community.
